Landscapes





Look at the photographs and examples of artworks below and on the next page. Look for similarities between the examples. Notice how each example is of an expansive nature scene. This is called a landscape and a land scape has a minimum of 3 layers: a foreground, a middle ground and a background.



Ask yourself: Is there a place in nature that I have visited or would like to visit that could be an inspiration for my artwork?



Learning Target: I can create a landscape—an image of nature that shows a lot of space and has a minimum of three layers.



In your art journal write down a few ideas for what type of landscape (or location) you might want to create. For example, you may want to make a mountain scene with a lake, or a desert scene with cactus, or a beach scene with palm trees. It could be something you've seen recently, a while ago, or you plan on seeing some day. You might want to sketch a practice drawing in your sketch book if you are not sure of your plan right away.



Make your artwork. Sit outside and observe or find a photo for inspiration and reference. Remember to include at least three layers—a foreground (front layer), a middle ground, and a background. I am including a page of photographs you can use as reference if you choose, or look through your own photographs, magazine/book pics or Google landscapes. I will be posting two how-to videos to my video page if you would like to see my process. As always, have fun, and don't forget to send me a picture of your amazing work!



Amusement Park Design





Look at the photographs and examples of artworks below and on the next page. There is also a YouTube web address for how to draw an amusement park below. (Just cut and paste it into your browser)



Ask yourself: Where would I like to go and have fun when we don't have to worry about staying at home any longer? Is it an amusement park? The zoo? A festival? A water park?



Learning Target: I can create a diagram or map of an amusement park (or other similar destination) that I would love to visit in the future.



In your art journal write down a few ideas for your diagram or map. Remember, you can list multiple places you would like to visit and pick the one that interests you the most or would make the most interesting drawing. This artwork could be of a place you have visited or one you want to visit, or a place you make up in your imagination.



Make your artwork. Remember to include a variety of details. For example, if you create an amusement park, don't forget to include different types of rides, games, attractions, food places, etc. Have fun and think big! And don't forget to send me a picture.

Look at the examples of artworks below and on the next page. You may also want to search for additional examples on Pinterest or a similar site. Each example should include text or a quote, a drawing, and a collage element.



Ask yourself: "Is there, or can I find a quote or piece of text, that is inspiring to me and use it in an artwork?"




Learning Target: I can create an artwork that includes inspirational text, a drawing portion, as well as collage elements.



In your art journal write a list of possible quotes you could use. (See my example at the bottom of the page.) There is also an idea page included in this lesson that you can choose one from. Brainyquote.com, song lyrics, a movie quote, or maybe a favorite saying of a grandparent make great choices as well! Choose one that you can visualize images or patterns that would look good with it, and then either draw a sketch of your idea or write a list of materials and images you could use (or both).



Make your artwork. Remember to include your text (write the name of the person responsible under the quote to give them credit), a drawing portion, and some sort of collage element. Be creative, have fun, and remember to send me a pic! And check out the student gallery—I update it often.



Collage: Creating artwork by gluing materials to a surface such as paper or cardboard.
Some materials commonly used for collage would be construction paper, wrapping paper, scrap book paper, magazines, newspaper, string, feathers, etc.



Ask yourself: "Where is my safe place or special object that brings me comfort and joy?"




Learning Target: I can create an artwork that represents a space or object that I find comforting.

Art Journal Prompts Kindergarten-1st Grade

April 13-17 Meditative Mandalas

Look at the photos of circle artworks from around the world called Mandalas. Look for similarities between the examples as well as what makes each unique.



Ask yourself: "Why were these made and can I make one for the same reason?"



Learning Target: I can create a mandala in a circle pattern. I can find a peaceful, mindful mood when creating my mandala.



Sketch at least one idea for your mandala in your art journal. If that turns into your final mandala, color it in carefully. Otherwise, where can you create your mandala and what can you make it out of? Could it be somewhere unexpected? Could it be out of unexpected materials? Remember: It doesn't need to stay forever.



Make your artwork or finish the one you started in your art journal. I will be making a mandala in my art journal and showing you in a video. (See my video page to check it out) I would love to see a pic of yours too!


